### DC COUNCIL HEARINGS

A legislative hearing is an opportunity for government to hear what the public thinks about a bill proposal. What happens in one?





### First, the Council opens the hearing.

- Chairman Mendelson will start the meeting and explain why he decided to hold a hearing on this bill.
- Councilmember Lewis George and other councilmembers can also give short speeches welcoming everyone and explaining why this bill is important to them.





- Witnesses will be called in the order they appear on the agenda. The agenda will be sent to you the day before the hearing.
- If you're there in person, the Chairman will call you up 4 at a time to sit at the witness table.
- When it is your turn to talk, you can push the button on the mic to turn it on. Red means on!
- If you're joining on Zoom, when you get called up you'll get promoted to a presenter and be able to turn on your camera and mic.

### Then, you testify!



- You'll read your testimony (you have up to 3 minutes, but we recommend keeping it to 1 minute)
- Councilmembers might ask you questions about your testimony. Here are examples of questions they might ask:
  - How did you get the idea of an official state amphibian for DC?
  - Why do you think the red-backed salamander should represent DC and not another amphibian like the bull frog?
  - What do you like most about red-backed salamanders?
- When the councilmembers are done asking questions you can leave the table or turn off your camera and mic on Zoom
- If you're in the room watching others testify, make sure to stay quiet so that the Council can hear what they're saying
- You're not allowed to bring big signs or posters into the Council building





## **GIVING TESTIMONY**

Testifying in a hearing is a direct way to tell councilmembers what you think about a bill.

Here are the steps to follow when you give your testimony:





# **Step 1:** Introduce yourself and say where you go to school!

Share a little bit about yourself! Answers to these questions help councilmembers learn more about you and why you are advocating for this bill.



# Step 2: Give 2 or 3 reasons why you think the red-backed salamander should be the official amphibian of DC!

Explain to the councilmembers why they should vote for this bill, and what would make the red-backed salamander a good symbol of DC and the people who live here.



# **Step 3:** Explain why this bill is important to you!

Tell the Council what the red-backed salamander being DC's official amphibian would mean for you and your classmates.



# <u>Step 4:</u> Thank the Councilmembers for listening and ask them to vote for the bill!

Make sure to thank the councilmembers for listening to your testimony! If you'd like, you can also wear stickers or t-shirts showing your support or pass out flyers to people in attendance.

### Signing up to testify

- You must register to testify before 5pm on Monday, 9/16. The link to register is lims.dccouncil.gov/Hearings/hearings/491
- If you need interpreters or accommodations, email cow@dccouncil.gov with your request by Tuesday, 9/10.
- If you don't want to testify in person or over Zoom, you can always just submit written testimony on the hearing page.



### **Getting to the hearing**

- The building address is 1350 Pennsylvania Ave NW.
- You can take the Red, Orange, or Blue Line to Metro Center, take the bus, or drive. There is no public parking at the building.
- You'll have to go through a metal detector and put backpacks and other belongings through the x-ray machine.
- Once inside, follow the signs to Room 412 where the hearing will be held.

- The recording of the hearing will also be posted on the Council website within a few days.
