




GUIDE TO

Cherry Blossoms

OF WASHINGTON DC



- ▶ Beyond the Tidal Basin, there are several places to see different cherry blossom species throughout DC.
- ▶ Peak bloom varies by species and usually extends from early March to mid-April.

There's more to DC's tree canopy

Cherry trees account for **less than 1%** of the **2.4 million** trees in DC. There are many more tree species to explore through our parks and neighborhoods. Washington, DC has a set a **goal of 40% tree canopy** coverage by 2032.

Common Cherry Trees in Washington, DC



Black Cherry

DC's largest cherry tree species, native to the area, and often found in wooded, natural areas



Okame Cherry

Blooms 1-2 weeks earlier than other cherries, with stunning displays of vivid pink



Chokecherry

Native to the DC area, can be found as shrubs or small understory trees



Snowgoose Cherry

With large white flowers, provides shade in summer and is resilient to urban conditions



Higan Cherry

A weeping tree known for its pinkish-white flowers that hang from its branches, emerging in early spring



Sour Cherry

Small, hardy, and self-pollinating trees that produce edible fruit



Kwanzan Cherry

These late bloomers are a colorful second act, with distinctive double flowers



Yoshino Cherry

The predominant cherry tree; makes up 70% of cherries around the Tidal Basin
